## A message from our Chief Executive

As we emerged from the COVID-19 pandemic and life started to get back to some sense of normality, we were hit with the cost-of-living crisis which presents different challenges.

We were heartened to see less of an impact on our fundraising income this year than anticipated and are proud that permissive access in the Forest was further expanded, giving our visitors more space to connect with nature and escape from their day-to-day stresses.

Once again, the Forest has grown and along with it the charity team that cares for it. Thanks to our expert team and wonderful volunteers, 127,748 native trees and shrubs were planted across 233 acres in five areas of the Forest. Through acquisitions we also added to the mature and ancient woodland, which now totals over 600 acres, being protected as part of the Forest mosaic.

Important as they are, the Forest is more than just trees, and this year we made great progress with our wetland and pond creation at Netherstead, as well as habitat management and enhancement at Gorcott Hill, improving conditions for wildlife and maximising the potential of our Forest sites for mitigating the effects of climate change.

Despite challenging times, thanks to your support we continue to make great strides towards our end goal of a 30,000-acre Forest to benefit the environment, wildlife, and people, both now and for hundreds of years to come.
